Find ways to offer help and be a blessing to them: listen to them, feed them, clothe them, providing warmth through blankets and/or quilts, or providing whatever your neighbor needs. It could just be a hug. We need to remember to be the hands and feet of Jesus Christ. Our PW purpose calls and challenges us.

In 2026, what is God calling you to do to provide hope and light to your neighbor?
What care and compassion are you being called to offer? Are you listening to where
God is calling you?

At Bdecan Presbyterian Church, we serve in the name of Jesus Christ—our compassionate Savior whose mercy knows no limits. These realities call us not to despair, but to action. We are reminded that we are the hands and feet of Jesus Christ in a world so desperately in need of His touch.

At Bdecan, this calling takes shape through simple yet powerful ministries:

- The Bdecan Food Pantry, open monthly and throughout the year with emergency boxes, stands as a beacon of hope for families struggling to make ends meet.
- The Clothing Closet and Winter Wear Ministry share coats, blankets, and dignity—each item a reminder that Christ’s love provides warmth in both body and spirit.

· Our Backpack and School Supply Giveaway and Vacation Bible School nurture the next generation with faith, joy, and the tools they need to thrive.

Every shared meal, every coat given, every child welcomed—these are sacred moments where Christ’s light breaks through the darkness.

2025 ANNUAL MISSION REPORT

PW groups reported the following highlights of favorite mission activities and why:

- (1) Hosting the annual Bazaar scheduled the same time every year brings PW members and community residents together. With record numbers in attendance and fundraising, this event allows the PW to support dozens of local organizations and benefits;
- (2) Working with the Emergency Food Pantry and New Life Center with their success in providing food, housing and jobs to the community;
- (3) Giving to Heifer International ensures gifts go directly to people in need;
- (4) Supporting radio broadcast of Sunday Service, now livestreamed, reaches out to a greater audience; and
- (5) several PW groups have donated school supplies, backpacks, milk cards, sweats, pants, underwear, socks, mittens, and caps. The local schools often contact PW first if a child has a specific need.

PWs in Northern Plains Presbytery are strong supporters of mission in the larger church such as the Thank and Birthday Offerings; Ecumenical missions such as the Fellowship of the Least Coin and World Day of Prayer; and several local missions such as food pantries, Bdecan Presbyterian Church, nursing homes, and local schools.

GOOD NEWS—PW groups are growing in number of events hosted for mission, the amount of funds raised for mission, time spent in mission, and a small but bold increase in members serving in mission activity.

A mission opportunity for PW groups is the collection of pill bottles which has made a comeback. There are two locations accepting pill bottles: (1) the Orphan Grain Train (ogt.org) warehouse at 103 Fourth Ave. SE in Jamestown and (2) Matthew 25: Ministries, 11060 Kenwood Road, Blue Ash, OH 45242.

All pill bottles must have the labels, and any glue residue from the labels, removed. The bottles must be washed, dried and sorted by size and color, put in Ziploc bags marked cleaned and boxed. Bottles must have plastic lids.

The drop-off schedule at the Orphan Grain Train warehouse is Monday or Saturday morning from 9:00 am to noon. There is an \$11/box shipping charge. The PCUSA's Matthew 25 Ministry Pill Bottle collection (m25m.org/pillbottles) must be mailed, at your own expense, to the Ohio address listed above.

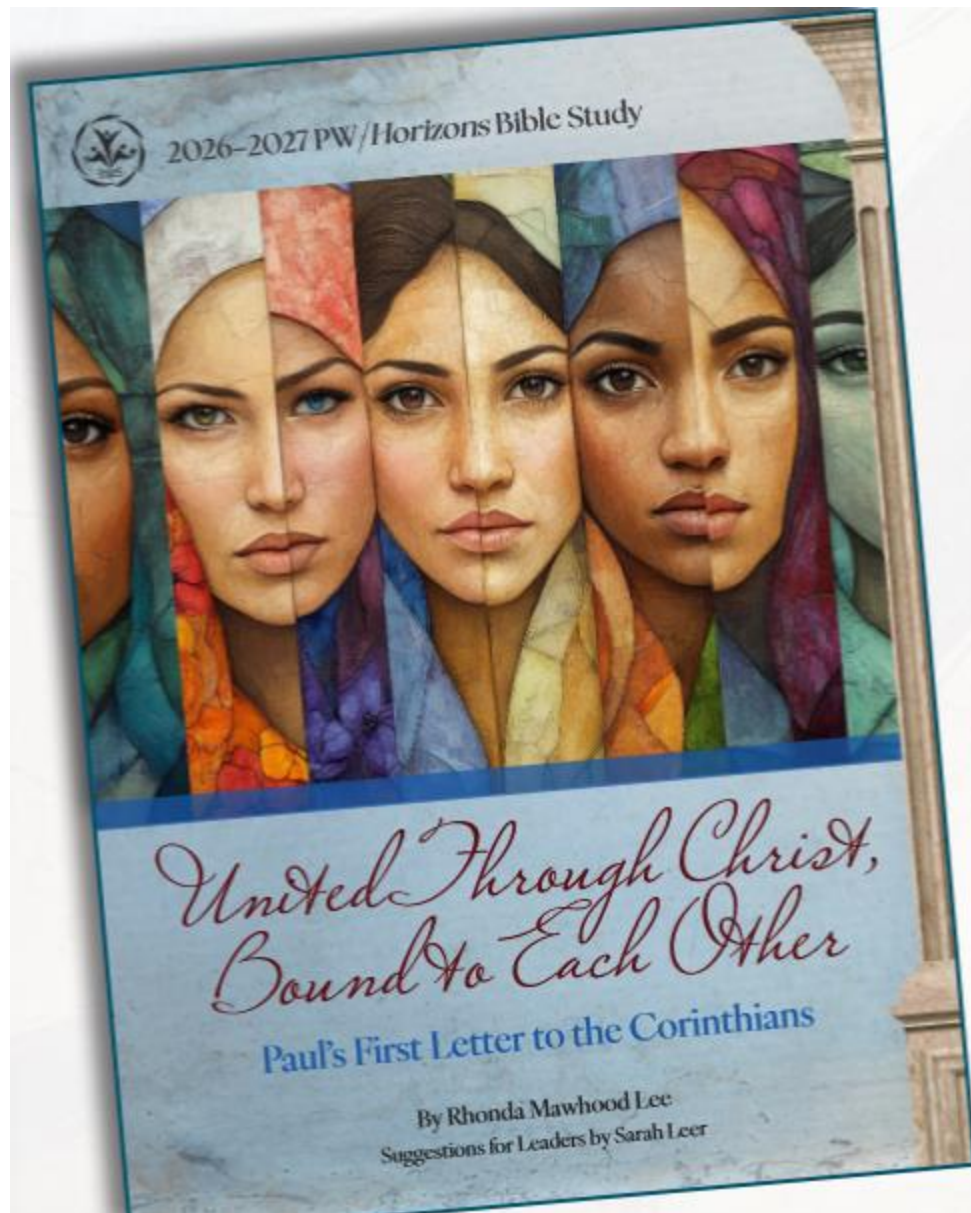

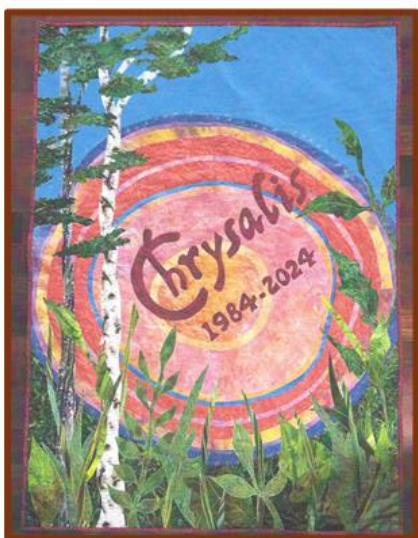
Our Daily Bread: What Do You "Knead?"

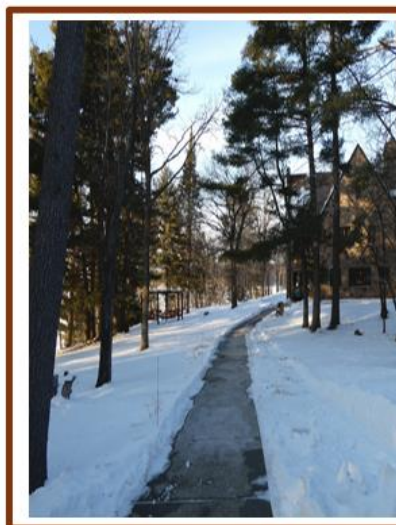

Fees, Registration, General Info

*Chrysalis fees cover two nights of lodging in a double room, speaker presentations, entertainment, programming and 5 meals. The cost is \$300 for a double lodge room. A \$75 deposit is required. Please note that for this winter camp, there are **only double rooms available**. When you register, be sure to indicate roommates with whom you would wish to share a room. If you do not have a preference, we will find a nice roommate for you. ☺

All fees paid, are refundable if a cancellation occurs at least 10 days prior to camp. If your cancellation occurs within 10 days of camp, all but \$75 is returned. (Thanks for understanding that programming must be planned, and food must be ordered.)

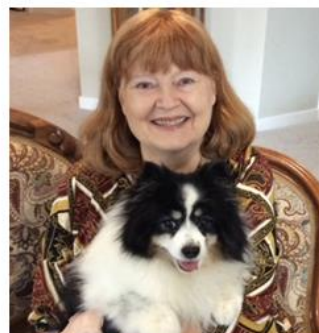
Kelsey Lynn Speaks is a speech-language pathologist who enjoys every kind of craft and always has too many little projects going. She lives in Lake Elmo with her family.
